### General Council Re-Elects Members to Serve on Tribal Council

Tribal Council Elections were held on Sunday, April 9, 2023 at the Tribal Hall in Coos Bay, Oregon. The three incumbents who were up for re-election shall remain in office according to the certified election results tallied by Isler CPA and members of the Election Board. Out of a total of 927 eligible voters of the Confederated Tribes, 213 ballots were submitted for the Council Election.

Thank you to all of those that participated in the Election and to all of the candidates who ran for Tribal Council. It is always encouraging to see such engagement

with Tribal Government. Congratulations to Council members Enna Helms, Julie Siestreem, and Iliana Montiel on your reelection to your positions on Tribal Council. Each of them shared a few words for membership:

Councilwoman Enna Helms has this to say, "Dear Tribal Community Members, I am humbled and honored to have been re-elected to position 1 in the recent Tribal election. I want to take a moment to specifically thank all candidates for running and express my deepest gratitude to all of you who took the time to cast your vote

I believe that this starts with a strong foundation of communication, respect, and transparency. Councilwoman Julie Siestreem shared, "Dear fellow members of our Confederated Tribes of Coos Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians, please know, I am humbly thankful, grateful, blessed and honored for all the support I received to continue my role as Position #3 Tribal Council for the next four years. My commitment has and will continue to be full-time for the best interests of the General Membership.

Additionally, please remember, I am one vote of seven and, am committed to collaborating with all fellow Council members in every decision we make.

With sincere respect and appreciation for all our Ancestors and previous Tribal Council members who have built a solid foundation for us, I believe our future is bright with promise for our next seven generations."

And finally, Councilwoman Iliana Montiel expressed that, "I would like to extend a huge thank you to those that re-elected me. It was very humbling and I received some very kind emails. I will do my best to achieve the goals I had listed. I truly want to move our tribe forward in a positive way. I invite tribal members to come to the council meetings to share their needs and to stay informed.

Please feel free to reach out to me at any time."

The elected Council officials take office directly following the certification of the Election results. As per Tribal Code Chapter 1-9 Tribal Council:

"1-9-4 Officers of the Tribal Council (a) Election of Officers The members of the Tribal Council shall elect from its members a Chairperson and a Vice Chairperson. [CLUSI Const. Art. IV, Section 1] Officers shall be nominated by Tribal Council members and elected by a majority vote of the Tribal Council. (b) Terms of Office Except as provided in CLUSITC 1-9-4(c) below, the officers of the Tribal Council shall serve from the time of their election as officers until the expiration of their current term on the Tribal Council."

Due to this code, Julie Siestreems' term as Vice-Chair ended as her previous term on Council ended. Therefore, the Tribal Council was tasked with voting and appointing the position of Vice-Chair. Tribal Council held a special meeting on April 13, 2023 to fill the role of Vice-Chair. Council Member Doug Barrett was elected by vote of Tribal Council to fill this position. Council would like to express their deepest gratitude to Julie Siestreem for serving in this role previously. They are grateful for her service and look forward to continuing to work side by side with her on Tribal Council in service to all Tribal membership.

### Tribal Council Corner

Greeting to our Tribal Families,

I hope this issue of our Newsletter finds you all well. I would like to update you on several things that are ongoing and of significant importance to all of us.

First the Hunting, Fishing and Gathering Agreement status. We are scheduled to meet with the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission in June. There are two or three other tribes scheduled for that meeting as well. When we get closer to the date, we will share more information about the meeting.

Next, the constitutional amendments. By the time you read this, you should have received a packet with the proposed amendments. If you have not received the packet, please contact Jeannie McNeil at the Tribal Government Offices, so that you can get that information. I hope that you will take the time to read the information and if you have anything to share, we look forward to seeing your comments. I know that there is some misinformation out there, and I want to reassure everyone that the purpose of these amendments are to allow this council and future councils to work for the improvement of the lives of our members and the protection and enhancement of our Sovereignty. I want were not enough members to hold an

to remind you that the BIA will send packets to ALL eligible voters who will need to register with the BIA in order to vote in this election. This is whether or not you are registered with the Tribe.

As you know, we just had a Tribal Council Election and I'm sure that you know what the results were. It was good to see the number of people that stepped up to run for council, no matter what the outcome was. It is important that we have participation and the contributions of our people to ensure the success of our tribe. Along with that, we need your participation in the voting

process. I know it's very difficult for those of you that live outside the immediate area to feel connected and feel like you know what is happening. I encourage you to tune in to Council Meetings and events even if you can't be here in person. The one good thing that Covid brought us is the ability to attend virtually all Council Meetings and other events through ZOOM. In this election, we received a total of 213 ballots, both in person and by mail. There are a total of about 661 registered voters out of a total of 927 eligible voters. It would be great to see more of us participate in the election process. I also know that outside the Five County Service Area, it might not seem to matter whether you vote or not. However, everyone should have an equal voice in the Tribe. In addition, there may be a time when we are able to extend more services outside the current service area. That is one of my goals.

And speaking of Council Meetings, as you may know, we had a Regular Council Meeting followed by a General Council Meeting. Unfortunately, there

official General Council Meeting and instead a listening session was held was attended by about eleven (11) people. Council heard from members about various topics of

interest and importance to them which was really appreciated.

After the Regular Council Meeting and before the General Council Meeting during the break, an Easter Dinner was prepared for those attending by Joe Barton. It was a great dinner with turkey, ham, potatoes, dressing, cake and more. Joe is a great cook, and did a great job. He was assisted

by several tribal members, serving and cleaning up. The dinner was attended by about 78 people, including children whom had participated in an Easter Egg Hunt facilitated earlier in the day by Nicole Romine from the Prevention Department.

We are seeing a significant reduction in that debt and are scheduled to have casino debt eliminated by early to mid 2024. This could change due to unforeseen circumstances of course, but we can now look to the future investment in our Tribe and our Tribal People. As part of this investment we are in the process of building out our Health Clinic. This will be a great asset to the health and wellness of our people. There may also be telehealth type of options along with that as well.

> In closing, there are important things coming and we are in a very good place and the future is bright. I want you all to be part of it.




### Lagauwiiyat'as, True History Gallery Upcoming exhibit planned for Fall/Winter 2023!

### **Big Canoe Arrives**

ocean vessel. Big Canoe was custom-designed and built specifically for the Tribe's needs by North River Boats out of Roseburg, Oregon. Big Canoe was purchased using a National Marine Fisheries Service grant, which was provided to the Tribe

to help mitigate the loss of fishing opportunities the that Tribe experienced when docks and boat ramps were closed at the beginning of the COVID pandemic. These grant funds will also be used to purchase equipment and gear used in the operation of the vessel, pay for fuel and maintenance, cover other and expenses operating during the first few years of operation. Credit is due to retired Tribal Biologist John Schaefer for identifying and securing this grant funding.

Big Canoe has a registered length of 34' 6", an overall length of 40', and a beam (width)



of 10' 6". She is powered by twin 300 horsepower Yamaha outboards, and also has a 25 horsepower Yamaha kicker motor which will be used when trolling for salmon. The outboards include an electronically-controlled steering package, which can be used to hold the vessel on a fixed location or steer it on a GPS-guided pre-set course. A bow thruster provides added maneuverability in tight quarters. The electronics package includes three 16" Simrad chart plotters, high and medium-frequency CHIRP sonar transducers, a 3D transducer, an AIS and GPS-enabled VHF marine radio, dual autopilot systems, and of course a Bluetooth stereo system. Safety equipment includes an 8-person selfinflating life raft, a life sling for man-over-board recovery, an

The Tribe recently took possession of Big Canoe, our new EPIRB emergency distress beacon, USCG-approved flares and distress signals, and self-inflating life jackets equipped with flashing emergency beacons. The vessel is equipped with a live well for storage of bait, shellfish, and other marine specimens. A 500-lb. capacity davit can be used to pull crab and shrimp pots,

> and is also equipped to lift a person out of the water in the case of an emergency. A heated cabin includes seating for 7, a refrigerator, a stove, and both 12v and 120v power outlets.

> Big Canoe will be used for a variety applications including taking Tribal Members on fishing crabbing and trips, securing traditional foods for Tribal gatherings, conducting offshore water monitoring, quality and assisting with restoration projects such as removing sea urchins to restore kelp forest habitat. We also expect to use the vessel to assist with a variety of research projects.

We are currently exploring the use of the vessel to research and monitor dentalium beds in the waters outside of Coos Bay.

We plan to start offering fishing and crabbing trips to Tribal Members and their immediate families in the near future. Target species will include rockfish, lingcod, halibut, salmon, and crab. As a first step, we hope to compile a call list of interested Tribal Members. As we start to plan fishing trips with Big Canoe, we will call Tribal Members on the list until we have enough participants to fill the boat. 


that call the bay home. They collected algae made pressed and cards. Afterwards they explored the amazing Marine Life Center and got up close and personal with creatures in the various touch



### May is Mental Health Awareness Month

#### What is mental health?

Mental health includes our emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It affects how we think, feel, and act. It also helps determine how we handle stress, relate to others, and make healthy choices. Mental health is important at every stage of life, from childhood and adolescence through adulthood.

Although the terms are often used interchangeably, poor mental health and mental illness are not the same. A person can experience poor mental health and not be diagnosed with a mental illness. Likewise, a person diagnosed with a mental illness can experience periods of physical, mental, and social well-being.

### Why is mental health important for overall health?

Mental and physical health are equally important components of overall health. For example, depression increases the risk for many types of physical health problems, particularly long-lasting conditions like diabetes, heart disease, and stroke. Similarly, the presence of chronic conditions can increase the risk for mental illness.

### Can your mental health change over time?

Yes, it's important to remember that a person's mental health can change over time, depending on many factors. When the demands placed on a person exceed their resources and coping abilities, their mental health could be impacted. For example, if someone is working long hours, caring for a relative, or experiencing economic hardship, they may experience poor mental health.

#### How common are mental illnesses?

Mental illnesses are among the most common health conditions in the United States.

- More than 50% will be diagnosed with a mental illness or disorder at some point in their lifetime.
- 1 in 5 Americans will experience a mental illness in a given year.
- 1 in 5 children, either currently or at some point during their life, have had a seriously debilitating mental illness.
- 1 in 25 Americans lives with a serious mental illness, such as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, or major depression.

#### What causes mental illness?

Mental health includes our emotional, **time?** There is no single cause for mental illness. psychological, and social well-being. It Yes, it's important to remember that a A number of factors can contribute to risk affects how we think, feel, and act. It also person's mental health can change over for mental illness, such as

- Early adverse life experiences, such as trauma or a history of abuse (for example, child abuse, sexual assault, witnessing violence, etc.)
- Experiences related to other ongoing (chronic) medical conditions, such as cancer or diabetes
- Biological factors or chemical imbalances in the brain
- Use of alcohol or drugs
- Having feelings of loneliness or isolation

One place to turn for help is the Tribal Health Reaching out InVolves Everyone (THRIVE) project at Northwest Portland Area Indian Health (NPAIHB). THRIVE is a suicide prevention project at the NPAIHB. THRIVE works to reduce suicide rates among American Indians and Alaska Natives living in the Pacific Northwest by increasing tribal capacity to prevent suicide and improving regional collaborations.

### Florence Oregon Area Kayakers Display Photos, Tribal Canoe Artifacts

April 7, 2023 — The Florence Oregon Area Kayakers, a group of kayaking and paddle-boarding enthusiasts from around the Central Oregon Coast and Lane County, will display photos of their kayaking adventures in the Siuslaw Public Library entrance hall,1460 9th St, Florence, throughout the month of April.

In addition to the display of photos by members, the group has worked with the Confederated Tribes of the Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians to put together a display of information and artifacts about the Tribal use of local waterways, around which the Tribes centered their lives.

For at least 8,000 years, and probably more, before kayakers started plying the lakes, rivers and estuaries of the South-Central Coast as the indigenous people were actively engaged in what the Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians call "canoe culture."

The Tribal display will include replicas of canoes the Tribes have used for centuries to traverse the rivers and lakes, paddles in various stages of completion and other items used in the culture, much of which are crafted from Western Red Cedar. The canoes played a significant role within the Tribes, including providing transportation, facilitating hunting waterfowl, fishing, collecting shellfish and kelp for food, and for entertainment in the form of canoe races. They continue to play an important ongoing role, including life skills training for Tribal youth like the Intertribal Canoe Journey and Canoe Families.

### Tribal Judge Attends Oregon Municipal Judges' Association (OMJA) Conference





Over the last year, the Blue Earth Federal Corporation board (BEFC) has divested itself of the two businesses that were under its care during COVID. The Blue Earth Services and Technology (BEST) business is in the process of closure and the assets sold to Tribal Member, Justin Krossman as it was deemed to have limited benefit for the Tribe, and more benefit for this Tribal Member to create his own business. The EZ Mini Storage business managed by BEST with the assistance of Kendell Smith was successfully transferred to the Tribe under the care of the Planning/Realty Department as it had matured into a profitable business with a strategic location for the Tribe. BEST transferred \$250,000.00 with this transition back to the Tribe for any remaining expenses necessary for this property and once finalized; all remaining funds will be transferred back to the Economic Development Fund for future use. Kendell has transitioned as a Tribal Government employee to continue in her previous capacity and we want to wish Justin well in his new ventures!

### **Economic Project Development:**

Blue Earth is a designated board of Tribal and non-tribal members who will collaborate with the Council, tribal members, staff, consultants, designers, engineers, and other stakeholders to shape and detail the needs required to make the Council's economic vision a reality.

#### **Property Development:**

Explore developing and bringing to fruition commercial and residential properties for the Tribe.

Future Goal: BEFC will be meeting with Tribal Council in May with the hope to begin Development of a Tribal Business Incubation & **Mentorship Program:** 



The purpose of the Gaming Commission is to regulate Class II and Class III gaming on the Confederated Tribes' Indian Land. The Commission consists of five (5) members appointed by a majority vote of the Tribal Council.
