Culture is Prevention Staff Host Family Friendly NARCAN Training, Float Hunt and Beach Clean Up Event



Florence, Oregon –

On Saturday, May 2, 2026, a Prevention Program Narcan Training and Glass Float Hunt was held for the Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Citizens and Families.

The Culture is Prevention Staff, Nicole Romine and Issac Dull, with the assistance from Health Department Staff Kristy Petrie, and Special Events Employees held an incredible event. Families gathered at the Abby's Pizza on Hwy 101 in Florence and listened to an informative presentation on Narcan (naloxone hydrochloride), an Opioid Overdose Medication Administration, led by Tribal Police Chief Brian Dubray. NARCAN® (naloxone hydrochloride) nasal spray is a fast-acting, over the counter (OTC) medication designed to rapidly reverse opioid overdoses by blocking the effects of opioids on the brain and restoring breathing.

By equipping individuals with naloxone and training to identify and respond to an overdose, the potential delay between the onset of an opioid overdose and the delivery of life-saving care can be reduced from hours to seconds.

Anyone can be affected by accidental overdose. Even some prescription drugs can cause an overdose if not taken as prescribed, or if ingested by someone for whom the drug was not intended. Please be sure to thoroughly read labels of narcotic medications and ask your doctor any questions you may have about its use.

Knowing the signs and symptoms of an opioid overdose is essential to responding quickly. Signs of overdose could include:

- Will not wake up or respond to a loud voice or rubbing firmly on the middle of their chest (sternum).
- Breathing is very slow, uneven, or has stopped.
- Center part of the eye is very small, sometimes call "pinpoint pupils"
- Fingernails and lips turning blue or purple.

If you encounter someone who you suspect is experiencing an overdose, here are the steps you can take to help them:

1. Check for breathing and try to wake the person up (sternum rub or calling out to them). If the person does not wake up, go to the next step.
2. Give 1st dose of Narcan (naloxone) in the nose. Insert the nozzle into the nostril and press the plunger to administer dose. (We learned from Chief Dubray that, if possible, give a half dose into each nostril).
3. Call 911 immediately after giving the 1st dose.
4. Watch. Wait 2-3 minutes after the 1st dose to give the medicine time to work. If the person does not wake up continue to give doses every 2-3 minutes until they wake up.
5. Stay with the person and prop them up on their side (in the recovery position) until ambulance arrives (even if the person wakes up). If the person becomes very sleepy again, you may need to give another dose.

It is safe to give Narcan even if opioids are not present.

Tribal and Special Events Employee Staff headed to the beach early to hide beautiful glass floats for all participants to find and provide information on opioid education to public community members. Tribal members helped clean up the Jetty and safely gather trash as we explored the beach and hillside for the hidden floats...

Council Corner

I want to start out by thanking membership for re-electing us to Tribal Council. I am honored to continue to work on behalf of our tribal citizens and serve as your Chair. I will continue to work diligently with our Tribal Council, tribal citizens, legislators, Federal, State and local partners, and staff to ensure we continue to protect and preserve our right to self-governance and protect our resources while preserving and promoting our cultural beliefs, as well as social and economic welfare of our tribal citizens looking ahead into the future.

I would also like to thank all who participated in the Bureau of Indian Affairs Secretarial Election and submitted your votes by the April 28th deadline. This is the first time our Constitution has been amended since its adoption on June 23, 1987. All the proposed amendments (excluding Amendment 5 which was withdrawn) passed by a 2/3rd vote of registered voters in favor of each proposed amendment. The election was certified by the BIA on May 7th, 2026 and is final. With the passing of the amendments, we will work with our legal department and staff to ensure all Codes and policies affected are updated accordingly.

The Tribal Council will begin focusing on refining committee processes and overseeing appointments. Committees are established to serve in an advisory capacity, assisting the Tribal Council in fulfilling its responsibilities to provide high-quality services to our tribal citizens and to safeguard the Tribes' assets and interests. Committee members generously

contribute their time and collaborate closely with program directors throughout the year, offering critical feedback and recommendations, as well as informing policy updates when necessary. This work further supports directors in identifying future programmatic opportunities and facilitates strategic planning through the budgeting process to ensure these obligations are met. We value this feedback and deeply appreciate all who dedicate their time to supporting this important work.

Over the next several months, the Tribal Council will focus on appointments to the Visions Committee, which will further support strategic planning efforts and the enhancement of services. This work will also inform strategic budgeting recommendations to achieve the Council's goals with all our membership in mind. The current process includes a 28-day public comment period, during which tribal citizens may submit feedback and suggestions regarding the budget. Additionally, the Tribal Council is considering a prior recommendation from the Budget Committee advocating for a third-party review of the budget proposal by an external vendor. Efforts will be made to streamline the budgeting process to ensure alignment with strategic goals and initiatives, reduce redundancy of our current process, and continue transparency through an open comment period, monthly financial reporting, third-party review, and audit reporting. The Tribal Council will be updating the budget

code to support formalizing these practices and processes.

There is significant work ahead, and I am honored to continue working to move our Tribe forward in a positive and meaningful way, guided by integrity and respect for our people. I encourage all tribal citizens to reach out to the Tribal Council at any time to share feedback, thoughts, and ideas. As we approach the Summer Solstice, I hope each of you have a healthy, happy, and safe summer season.

Pursuant to 25 C.F.R. § 81.45, this letter is to advise you of our decision to approve the results of the Secretarial Election held for the Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians (Tribe).

On January 5, 2026, the Tribe enacted Resolution Number 26-001, requesting that a Secretarial Election (Election) be held to decide on proposed amendments to the Constitution of the Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians. The request was received on January 6, 2026, and upon our determination that the request was perfected pursuant to 25 C.F.R. § 81.6, we authorized Sharon Jackson, Northwest Regional Office, to work with Bobbi Mollenberg, Secretarial Election Chair, to call and conduct the Election.

The Election was held on April 28, 2026. The following six proposed constitutional amendments (proposed Amendment 5—Article VIII-Elections—was withdrawn) were submitted to the membership for a vote:

- Article II, Hunting, Fishing, Trapping and Gathering Rights
- Article III, Membership
- Article V, General Council
- Article VI, Tribal Council
- Article X, Removal and Recall
- Article XIII, Amendments

Each of the foregoing proposed amendments was duly adopted, with at least thirty (30) percent of the 270 registered voters casting ballots. A total of 136 ballots were cast, with 1 spoiled ballot per proposed amendments (2 spoiled ballots total for Article VI, Tribal Council). The Election Board Chair advises that zero (0) challenges to the results were submitted. Each proposed amendment was reviewed and found not to be in violation of federal law.

Therefore, the proposed amendments are hereby approved as "Amendment I" to the Constitution of the Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians. This decision constitutes a final agency action. 25 C.F.R. § 81.45(b)(1) through (4).

The Certificate of Approval, including the original text as adopted, as well as the Certification of Results of Election, are enclosed herein. 25 C.F.R. § 81.45(d)(1).

We appreciate the time and effort the Secretarial Election Board invested in conducting this election.

Pursuant to an election authorized by the Acting Northwest Regional Director, Kurt Fredenberg, on April 28, 2026, the attached Proposed Amendments 1 through 7, with Proposed Amendment 5 WITHDRAWN, to the Constitution of the Confederated Tribes of the Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians were submitted to qualified voters of the tribe and were, on April 28, 2026, duly adopted/rejected by the votes recorded below, in an election in which at least thirty percent (30%) of those entitled to vote cast their ballots, in accordance with the Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Restoration Act of October 17, 1984 (98 Stat. 2250), and the Indian Reorganization Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984), as amended by the Act of June 15, 1935 (49 Stat. 378).

Placename Honoring Ceremony

August 3rd - 11:00 a.m.

"In English the Native people often called the village "Winchester Bay", since it was very close to Winchester Bay. Its name, that the quuiich people who lived there, knew it as tkimya.

The village site was excavated in 1974, 1980, and 1994. Carbon dating showed that tkimya was inhabited continuously for 3000 years. It was an important travel point – people were ferried across the river here. Being an important transportation point, bilingualism was common at this village – not only did people speak quuiich dialect of sha'yuusht'a ut quuiich but also spoke hanis.

James Buchanan, a hanis man married to a quuiich woman, Eliza, knew many quuiich stories and he told many stories set at this village. Stories like The Woman Who Married Wolf, The Woman Who Married Sea Serpent, Eagle Woman, among others. The village was also known for its gardens on the hill slope above.

In our tribe, the Macy family descend from a woman whose family was from "Winchester Bay" and it was probably from this village, which was a more politically prominent village than the other Winchester Bay village, kawliich (also known as kuuliich), which is just a short distance downriver from tkimya."

Place Naming Ceremonies

Place-naming ceremonies do not appear to be something our ancestors traditionally practiced. However, naming ceremonies were an important part of our culture, when individuals received their "good names" sometime in their later childhood.

The place-naming or placename honoring ceremonies we hold today are rooted in those traditional practices. As we work to bring our language back to our lands, it is important that we remember and restore the original names that existed before English names were imposed. These ceremonies are a way for us to reclaim and honor those names.

The current ceremony structure outlined below represents one current approach, though **ceremonies may vary** greatly depending on the place, time of year, community needs, and cultural considerations. Families are encouraged to carry forward and develop their own ceremonies connected to place and kinship.

Placename Honoring Ceremony Protocol

The Chief blesses the food, and everyone eats first.

Then, a plate of food is made up, a little of everything, and given to the Doctor/Chief/Elder of that place, if not available, then someone who can represent the familial ties to the people of that place, and calls out the name of the place while offering the plate of food.

(Note: This plate of food is put together by a Tribal member of the family who is from that place or can help represent the family of that place and is selected by the person who calls the name out.)

The Doctor/Chief/Elder calls out the name 3 times. The community listens, and after the 3rd time hearing the name, the community repeats the name in celebration.

Then, the food plate is placed in the fire (if fire is allowed), if not then on the land by a tree.

Then, the Tribal community shares in the telling of family and cultural songs and stories.

Gifts are given only by the Tribal members of that place.

Song led by Tribal member(s) of that place and may invite any member of the Tribal community to assist the

Place representative and/or Tribal member to gift words of gratitude for the intersection of our partnership, coming together with trust, understanding, and respect.

The Chief or place point person will give the name of the place, and what it means to our community.

Gifts are given only by the Tribal members of that place, with gratitude to the tribal artisans in the making of the gifts.

Then, stories are shared by storytellers and speakers (appointed by Tribal representatives and people of the place) and invite the public to share stories relevant to the partnership and restoration of that place. Stories are interactive and collaborative.

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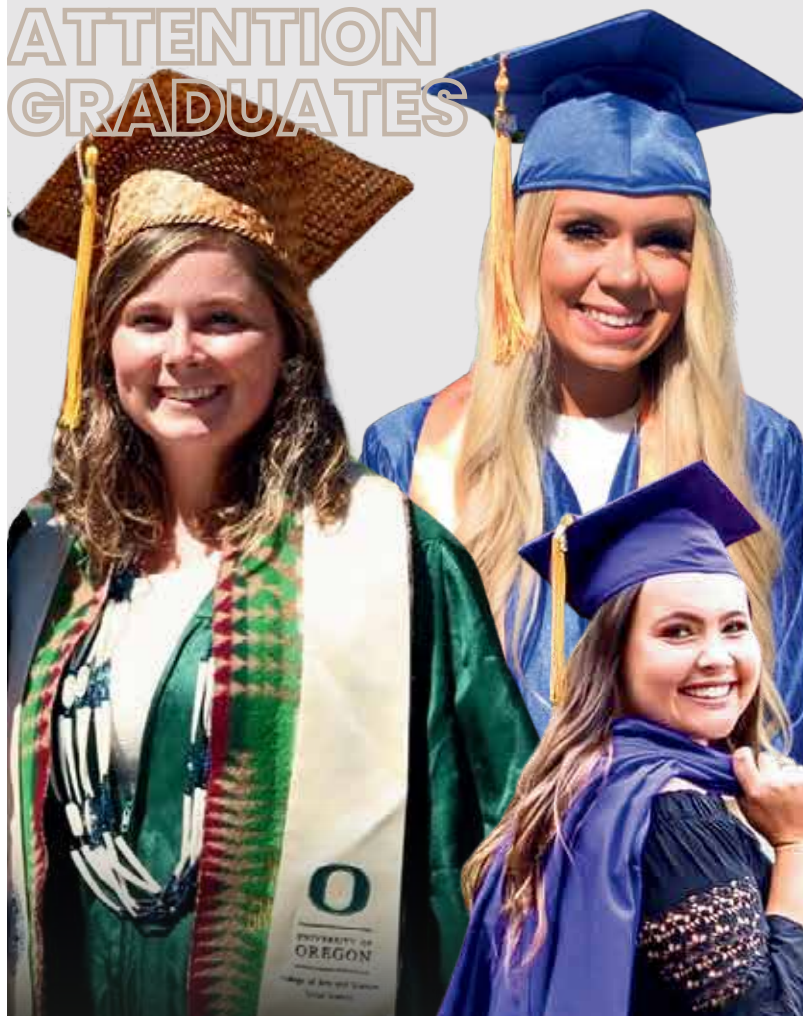

MMIP Event Hosted by CTCLUSI Circles of Healing

Circles of Healing hosted an event to raise awareness for Murdered and Missing Indigenous people on May 9th from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. For decades, Indigenous communities across North America have sounded the alarm about a heartbreaking and largely overlooked crisis: the disproportionately high number of Indigenous people—particularly women, girls, and Two-Spirit individuals—who go missing or are murdered, often without resolution or media attention. This ongoing injustice is known as the **Missing and Murdered Indigenous People (MMIP)** crisis.

Today, thanks to relentless grassroots activism, growing public awareness, and government collaboration, the MMIP movement has not only gained momentum—it has begun to change lives, policy, and perceptions.

Our entire community has felt the impact of MMIP. This event brought awareness and renewed a sense of hope that we can stand together to make a difference. Annual events like the **National Day of Awareness for MMIP on May 5** have drawn thousands of participants, with red handprints, marches, and digital campaigns symbolizing the silenced voices that can no longer be ignored. Staff presented red dresses and ties, along with posters of the listed Missing Indigenous persons in Oregon. Chief Barrett was able to come and open the event in a good way, followed by David Rudder who spoke about what MMIP is and how it is affecting our Communities.

The Circles of Healing team was also able to provide burgers, hot dogs, and cupcakes to all those that attended. Members of the community were able to learn about Missing Indigenous people in Oregon, data around those that are missing, and statistics on the rates of indigenous people who are affected by this epidemic. Following the Speaker and lunch, staff and community members moved down to the Boardwalk to hold signs to raise awareness. The Circles of Healing Team and Social Services staff would like to thank everyone that was able to attend and stand with us along the Coos Bay Boardwalk to raise awareness of this issue.

Tribal Committee appointments are made by Tribal Council and are for a four (4) year term. Tribal Code allows for you to be on no more than three (3) committees at a time and you may only serve two (2) terms, unless special consideration is necessary. You must complete a Letter of Interest Form to be considered by the Tribal Council.

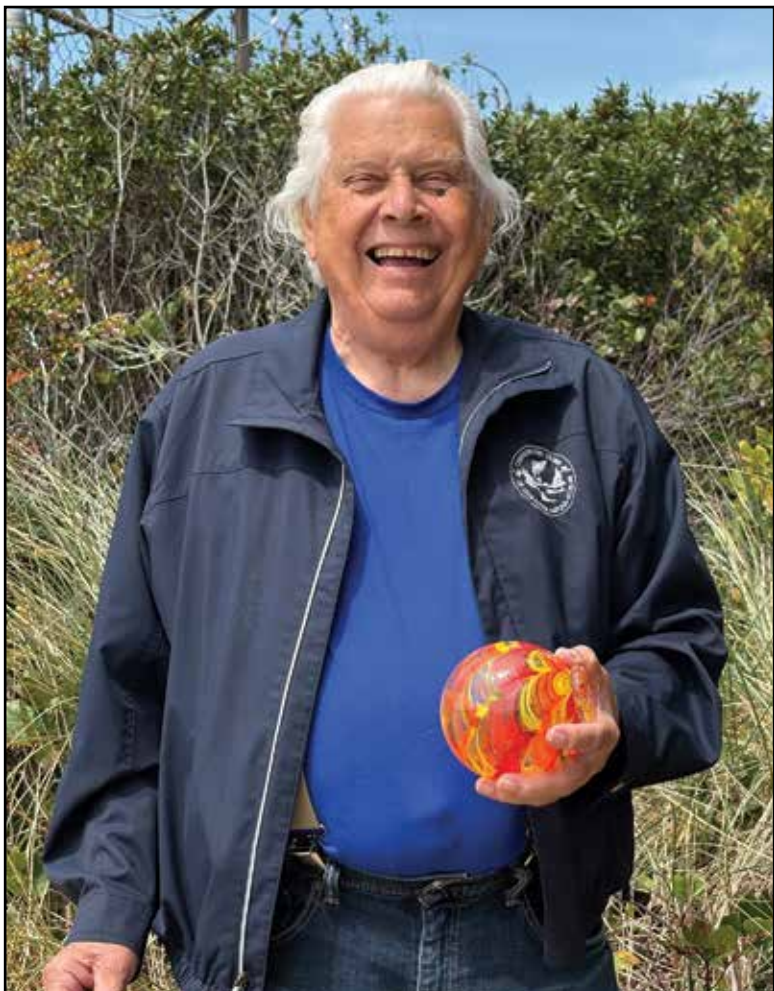
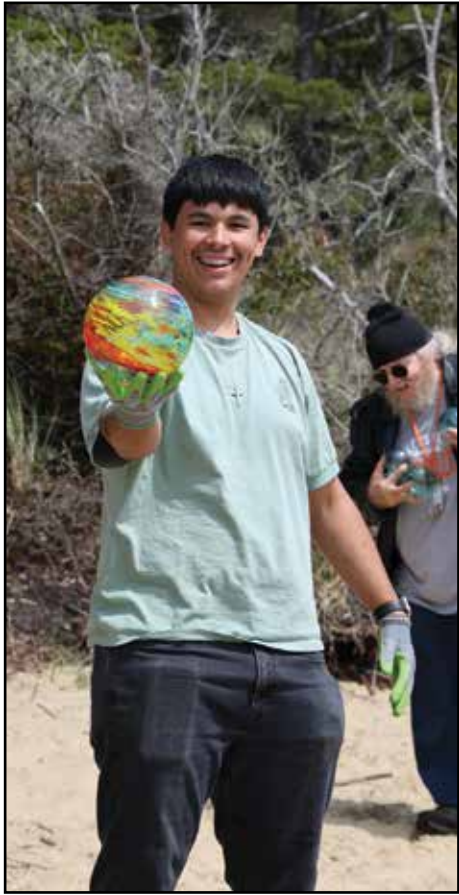

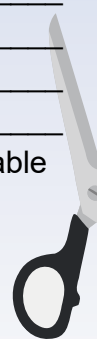

Good Tenants are Good Neighbors

When we think about the term 'good tenant' we usually think about those who are responsible and pay their rent on time, but a good tenant is also a good neighbor.

Introducing yourself is a great way to begin to get to know your neighbors! This is an opportunity to get to know their names, interests, and daily routines. By having a conversation and getting to know one another, you can identify potential problems or conflicts before they happen.

Good tenants respect and are considerate of their neighbors, along with the shared environment. This includes keeping the area around their home, common areas, driveways or shared yards free from trash, debris, or animal feces. It also includes picking up litter, even if you haven't caused it – this makes the area look nice and sets a good example.

If you live in an apartment, or multiplex style environment, be aware that there are shared walls/floors and sometimes you might not think the noise level is loud, it could sound completely different to your neighbors. Be considerate of those around you, as they may have different work/sleep schedules. Adhere to quiet times, typically between 10pm-8am. Sometimes due to the way the building was built, noise and vibrations can be carried, whether it be the result of poor insulation, age, or design flaw.

Ensuring your pets are trained, behave, and follow the rules of your rental agreement and/or pet policy helps foster good relations with your neighbors and adds to the sense of community. Make sure to clean up after your dog, and that they are always attached to a human. No one likes seeing or picking up other animals' waste. Being a responsible pet owner is being a good neighbor.

Sometimes relations with neighbors can get rocky due to disagreements, making it difficult for everyone. Having respectful, adult conversations are essential to a harmonious and healthy living environment. If there is an issue or problem, try to have a civil conversation with your neighbor that works toward resolving the issue while finding a compromise that benefits everyone. This shows your neighbor that you are mature enough to handle a disagreement in a polite respectful manner, and that you care about the relationship.

Good tenants are good neighbors, and they can be the start to great friendships. But every friendship needs respect,

boundaries, and nurturing. By being a mindful tenant and having respect for yourself, your home, and the environment in which you live, you are nurturing yourself, your home, your environment, your community and in a round-a-bout way – the relationship with your neighbor.

The Tribal Police Department participated in National Drug Take Back Day on Saturday, April 25th. We also visited each of the government offices on Thursday and Friday to allow for as many Tribal members and staff to participate. At this event we collected 67 pounds of medications. Since

we began partnering with the DEA on this program in 2018, we have collected over 467 pounds of medications that would otherwise be disposed of in our landfills and waterways. It was the first time I've had to request an additional shipping label from the DEA due to the amount collected.

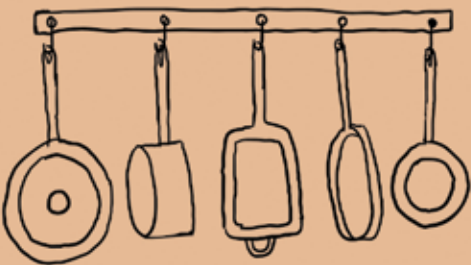

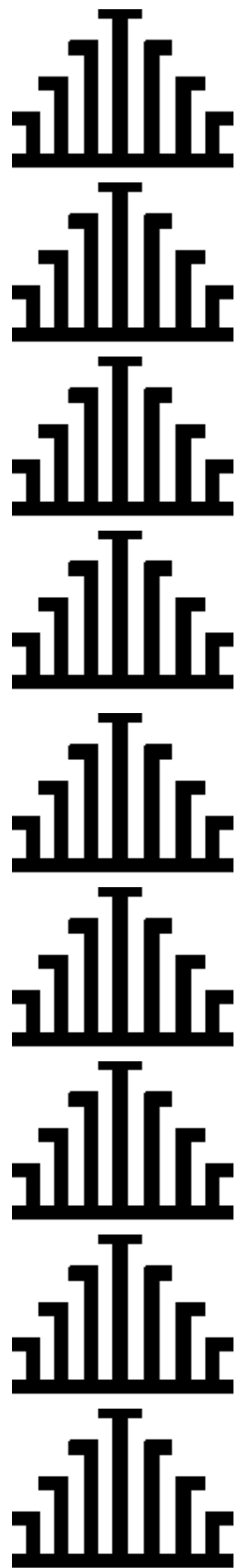
